We are writing to express our support for the United States federal statistical system and the work it performs to provide data that are critically important to the functions of our economy, society, and democracy. The U.S. economy is more dependent upon data than ever before, particularly as we prepare for the 2020 Census and Congress evaluates the benefits of evidence-based policymaking legislation.

Members of the statistical community, both within and outside the government, have worked for many years to improve public appreciation of the importance, reliability, and trustworthiness of federal data. Because agencies are limited in their ability to defend against attacks to the system, others must elevate public discourse about the integrity of government data and the value of the federal system. Especially in the current political environment, this defense is greatly needed.

In the coming days, the American Statistical Association (ASA) will launch an education campaign to engage journalists, business organizations, legislative and policy contacts, and others about the importance of the federal statistical system. The newly-created Count on Stats initiative will consistently reaffirm the value of the federal agencies that comprise the system and of the work they do.

ASA is in a unique position to provide a strong, independent, and non-partisan voice in support of the system. Such independence also ensures that no attack on agencies or their work goes unanswered. Among the organizations partnering with ASA in this effort are:
